FALL – HERE...AND ALMOST GONE; TIME FLIES!

I hope you're having a great hunting season. My thoughts have certainly been on hunting...not so much for myself, but on programs underway for young Oklahoma hunters...and on preparations for our SCI chapter's annual March celebration of our hunting heritage—the banquet.

For our young hunters...

- ...In recent weeks we've helped with our support of a generous program hosted by one of our members, John Miller, who provides deer hunting opportunities for young Oklahomans. We sponsored dinner one evening—for the young hunters, their family members, and the volunteers who make this annual hunt possible.
- ...We also recently provided a number of ground blinds for another deer hunting opportunity for youngsters...that of the Oklahoma Youth Hunting and Shooting Program. Another of our members, Denver McCormick, also provided a blind for this youth program.
- ...ODWC completed several hunter-education classes just in time for deer season, and we encouraged young hunters by purchasing hunting licenses for a number of them (ODWC makes "our" licenses available through a small essay-writing opportunity given at each class).
- ... We again participated in ODWC's annual "Wildlife Expo". An estimated 51,000 visitors took part in this, the sixth such event. As in previous years, our chapter's interactive wildlife exhibit was enjoyed by thousands of youngsters and adults.

The upcoming banquet will be a big one! Last March's great banquet featured approximately \$350,000 worth of hunts, other trips, and merchandise in our live & silent auctions.

This one will top \$450,000! You will enjoy many really outstanding items—and excellent food!

For the banquet, in this issue of Safari Trails you'll find:

- the ticket purchase form; seats are cheapest if purchased early, and they are on sale now;
- the form for purchase of an optional Alaska fishing trip (a \$3,250 value for \$500);

YOUNG OUTDOOR WRITERS SHARE HUNTING HERITAGE, WIN OUTDOOR GETAWAYS

A statewide youth outdoor writing contest is giving Oklahoma youth a chance this year to share their outdoor heritage while competing for the chance to win an all-expense-paid outdoor getaway.

According to Colin Berg, education supervisor for the Wildlife Department, the essay contest is an ideal way for youth to show their love for the outdoors and, in the process, possibly win a vacation in the great outdoors.

To participate, students must be 11-17 years of age and currently enrolled in any Oklahoma school or home school. Students also must use the theme of "Hunting: Sharing the Heritage" or "Archery: What I like about Archery in the Schools and Bowhunting" or the concept of the theme to develop a descriptive essay or short story. Winners of the previous year's contest are not eligible. Applicants must have successfully completed an Oklahoma Hunter Education course by the entry deadline, which is Nov. 19, 2010. There are two age categories — 11-14 and 15-17.

Winners in the 15-17 age category (one boy and one girl) will receive a guided antelope hunt in New Mexico, and winners in the 11-14 age category are competing for a scholarship within the Apprentice Hunter Program at the YO Ranch in Mountain Home, Texas. Safari Club International's Apprentice Hunter Program is a unique, hands-on course designed for girls and boys aged 11-14. The program covers topics such as the history of hunting, the ethical basis of modern sport hunting, wildlife management, field identification, tracking and interpreting sign, game cooking and the SCI Sportsmen Against Hunger Program. There are three sessions—each one week long—during the summer of 2011.

The four statewide winners and their legal guardians will be invited to Oklahoma City to attend an awards ceremony in March. In addition, the top 25 essay entrants will receive a one-year youth membership to Safari Club International. The Oklahoma State Chapter will reimburse trip travel expenses to New Mexico and Texas up to \$500 per essay contest winner. The winning student essays will be published in the OSCSCI newsletter, "Safari Trails." Publication qualifies the winning entries for the Outdoor Writers Association of America Youth Writing Contest. Several past national winners have come from Oklahoma. Essays may also be printed in Outdoor Oklahoma magazine.

Two educators also will be awarded all-expenses-paid scholarships for an eight-day conservation education school at Safari Club International's American Wilderness Leadership School (AWLS) at Granite Ranch near Jackson, Wyoming.

The AWLS program is conducted during the summer and presents an outdoor program for educators that concentrates on natural resource management. Participants learn about stream ecology, map and compass, language arts and creative writing in an outdoor setting, fly tying, shooting sports, wildlife management, the Yellowstone ecosystem, camping, white-water rafting, educational resources and how to implement outdoor education ideas.

Essays and applications must be postmarked no later than Nov. 19, 2010, or delivered by Nov. 19 in person to the Department of Wildlife's Jenks Office at 201 Aquarium Drive, Jenks. Description: Guided Black Bear Hunting in British Columbia, rifle or archery. Hunt dates are when the bears are fresh from hibernation, and hides are excellent.

This area has a very high population of LARGE color phase black bears, because of excellent habitat and the fact that it is not over hunted. We mainly hunt them only two weeks in the Spring season when they are fresh out of hibernation and concentrated on feeding areas where they are relatively easy to find and stalk. The hides are excellent at that time, much better than coastal bears because of our colder temperatures. Success rates are very high during this time, averaging 170% for many years, because many hunters will shoot two bears. The hides range in size from 5 feet to 8 feet squared.

Our bear hunting camp is located on a remote lake 80 miles West of Prince George, where I pick you up for the drive to the camp. Prince George has daily commercial flights from Vancouver, and you may also drive to Prince George. The camp is located right in great bear hunting, with good feed close by. From our bear camp we drive old logging roads that lead through old logged areas that produce excellent feed for the bears. We are able to spot and stalk the bears without long hikes. Often we can glass them from a distance and judge their size. We pick up the hides at the camp soon after the kill and fly them to the freezer at the lodge, insuring no spoilage occurs. Rainbow trout are plentiful at the bear camp, also at the main lodge at Moose Lake, where you may stay and fish after you have shot your bears. The floatplane flight to the main lodge for fishing is included in the package price.

Your hunt is 1x1 guided and includes the kill fee for one bear. You may take a second bear, paying only the US\$800 kill fee. Your hunt also includes the transportation from Prince

George, and the delivery of your trophies to a local taxidermist. A second hunter may be added for US \$6,000 1x1 guided, or the second hunter may share your guide for US \$4,750. As with your hunt, the second person's hunt includes the air charter and the kill fee for one bear; and a second bear may be added for an additional US\$800 kill fee.

Hunting license cost is \$180 CAN. Each bear license costs \$180 CAN. There is a Non-Resident Hunting Preservation Fee of \$125 CAN. All fees are subject to a 6% tax. [2010 costs quoted] All guides in BC charge the NRHP fee, and all guides in Canada charge the 5% tax. These license costs, fees, and tax are in addition to the hunt prices but the outfitter will purchase the licenses for you in advance. Any required firearms permit fees, transportation from your origin to Prince George and return, and tips are costs in addition to the hunt fees.

If you've investigated Canadian bear hunts, you've probably found them ranging in price from \$2,500 for the baited tree stand hunts to \$9,000 for a 2-bear hunt on Vancouver Island. The Fawnie Mountain hunt is for the hunter that wants super guides, big bears, quality food and accommodations, many great memories, all at a reasonable price.

Your hosts, the Blackwells have owned and operated this business for over 40 years. Some of the guides have been guiding here 17 years, some 13 years, etc. There is a sense of competition among the guides to find the biggest bears. The organization knows how to produce a quality hunting experience for trophy animals.

Suitable rifles are available if a hunter chooses not to bring his/her own. Archery is acceptable. Handguns are not permitted.

A non-hunting companion could stay at the lodge, with fishing and hiking as the activities; or may stay in the bear camp and accompany the hunter in the 4x4 and watching/filming the stalk. Fishing is also available at the camp. Cost for the non-hunter is US\$1,500, including the pick up in Prince George and the float plane flight to the main lodge at Moose Lake.

Obama Administration Reverses Course, Forbids Sale of 850,000 Antique Rifles

The South Korean government, in an effort to raise money for its military, wants to sell nearly a million antique M1 rifles that were used by U.S. soldiers in the Korean War ato gun collectors in America.

The Obama administration approved the sale of the American-made rifles last year. But it reversed course and banned the sale in March – a decision that went largely unnoticed at the time but that is now sparking opposition from gun rights advocates.

A State Department spokesman said the administration's decision was based on concerns that the guns could fall into the wrong hands.

"The transfer of such a large number of weapons -- 87,310 M1 Garands and 770,160 M1 Carbines -- could potentially be exploited by individuals seeking firearms for illicit purposes," the spokesman told FoxNews.com.

"We are working closely with our Korean allies and the U.S. Army in exploring alternative options to dispose of these firearms."

Gun control advocates praised the Obama administration for taking security seriously.

"Guns that can take high-capacity magazines are a threat to public safety," said Dennis Henigan of the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence. "Even though they are old, these guns could deliver a great amount of firepower. So I think the Obama administration's concerns are well-taken." But gun rights advocates point out that possessing M1 rifles is legal in the United States -- M1s are semi-automatics, not machine guns, meaning the trigger has to be pulled every time a shot is fired -- and any-one who would buy a gun from South Korea would have to go through the standard background check.

"Any guns that retail in the United States, of course, including these, can only be sold to someone who passes the National Instant Check System," said David Kopel, research director at the conservative Independence Institute. "There is no greater risk from these particular guns than there is from any other guns sold in the United States."

M1 carbines can hold high-capacity ammunition clips that allow dozens of rounds to be fired before reloading, but Chris Cox, chief lobbyist for the National Rifle Association, noted that is true about any gun in which an ammunition magazine can be inserted -- including most semi-automatics.

"Anything that accepts an external magazine could accept a larger capacity magazine," Cox said.

"But the average number of rounds fired in the commission of a crime is somewhere between 1 and 2 ... this issue just shows how little the administration understands about guns."

He called the administration's decision "a de facto gun ban, courtesy of Hillary Clinton's State Department."

Asked why the M1s pose a threat, the State Department spokesman referred questions to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. ATF

representatives said they would look into the question Monday afternoon, but on Wednesday they referred questions to the Justice Department. DOJ spokesman Dean Boyd referred questions back to the State Department.

According to the ATF Guidebook on Firearms Importation, it would normally be legal to import the M1s because they are more than 50 years old, meaning they qualify as "curios or relics." But because the guns were given to South Korea by the U.S. government, they fall under a special category that requires permission from the State Department before any sale.

Kopel said that he hopes the State Department spokesman's statement that it is working to "dispose" of the guns does not mean they want to melt them down.

"It seems to have this implication of destruction, which would be tremendously wasteful," he said. "These are guns that should be in the hands of American citizens for marksmanship and safety training."

Asked whether melting the guns down would be a good option, Henigan said: "Why let them into the country in the first place? If there is a legally sufficient way to keep them out, we think it's perfectly reasonable to do so."

Past administrations have also grappled with the

issue of large-scale gun imports.

The Clinton administration blocked sales of M1s and other antiquated military weapons from the Philippines, Turkey and Pakistan. It also ended the practice of reselling used guns owned by federal agencies, ordering that they be melted down instead.

In contrast, 200,000 M1 rifles from South Korea were allowed to be sold in the U.S. under the Reagan administration in 1987.


A decision like that would be better for everyone, Cox said.

"M1s are used for target practice. For history buffs, they're highly collectible. We're going to continue to make sure that this backdoor effort that infringes not only on lawful commerce but on the Second Amendment is rectified."

Henigan disagrees.

"They clearly were used as military guns, and the fact that they likely can take high-capacity magazines makes them a special safety concern," he said.

The White House referred questions on the issue to the Pentagon, which referred questions to the U.S. Embassy in South Korea, which deferred back to the State Department.



Just Another Day In The Bush

Foreword by Mike Mistelske:

On horseback in the wilds of Africa...

Although not a chapter member, Debra Waterston is one of the scores of people who work hard behind the scenes to create our annual fundraiser banquet & auction. Debra has braved—and enjoyed--three horseback expeditions in Kenya, Africa, covering almost 600 miles across the bush in all. Debra has been kind enough to share a little of one of those adventures with us in this article. Thanks, Debra.

Stumbling out of my tent overlooking the Mara River, I stood for a moment, blinking at the early morning sun. Low growling grunts accompanied by giant splashes rose from the river below as hippos jostled each other for the best mud bath spot. From behind my tent, high-spirited horses, impatient for their breakfast, engaged in a production of foot stomping and restless whinnying.



Tall feathery Acacia trees shaded my friends gathered around a campfire. Downing steaming cups of coffee, they filled their saddlebags with sandwiches, laced up their boots, and huddled in sweaters to ward off the early dawn chill which reminded us that Kenya, despite being close to the equator, is a land of high elevations.

Among our group were three safari virgins, three doctors, including my friend Bubba, an anesthesiologist on the run from respectability, and a couple of veterans like myself, unable to stay away, hooked on the heady mix of wonder, fear and excitement that these trips gave in return for our hard earned cash. We were led by Mark, an ex-steeplechase jockey, exprofessional golfer, current hell-raiser, and the best rider I had ever seen.



I had traveled with Mark before and had come to the conclusion that he made Indiana Jones look like a kindergarten teacher. I had seen this guy intimidate a herd of cape buffalo with nothing more then a bullwhip, stand off poachers, and outrace a herd of wildebeest across the plains on horseback. Mark didn't speak often, but I had learned to listen carefully when he did, and move instantly at his command. Our lives out here depended on him.

We gathered our saddlebags and walked to the other end of camp where the horses stood waiting for us. The African crew fussed over the horses, tightening a cinch here, adjusting a bridle there. The horses are a Somali/Thoroughbred cross resulting in tough, brave animals that are the lifeblood of the outfitter. The care lavished on these horses would make a Kentucky Derby winner jealous. They are in prime shape, well able to endure the one hundred fifty miles we would cover in the next two weeks as we journeyed from the Masai Mara plains at six thousand feet to the nine thousand foot rock strewn Loita Hills.



In the mist of the herd was my favorite, Kinankop, a strong quick-witted dapple-gray. In the off-season, like most of the horses, Kinankop is used as a polo pony. Subtle weight shifts are all it takes to turn him, and a slight squeeze of my legs brings forth instant speed, matching a Ferrari in quickness of response. I didn't mind that he always tried to bite me first thing in the morning, grumpily resenting the start to his long day. He has carried me safely on two previous safaris and has earned my respect and gratitude.

As we mounted up, I said a little prayer under my breath that our luck would hold for this third trip. As we passed into the bush, I let slip to the ground a four-leaf clover, one of four that I had found and saved from my first trip to Kenya. On each returning trip, I would bring one back at a time, returning to Africa what was originally hers.



Ahead of us was a day's ride to the next camp on the Olare Oroc River about twenty miles away. We would be traveling through a mix of what is called "heavy bush", where you can't see much further then a few feet ahead, and open savannah teeming with zebra, gazelles, wildebeest, and giraffes.



We hoped to miss the predatory cats that would consider the horses a nice lunch.





Following Mark into the thorn bush and Acacia trees, we headed out single file, staying close behind each other. The thorn bush wrapped around us like a dense maze, closing off everything in sight beyond the horse in front.

Kinankop and I brought up the end of the line. I was slowly waking up, enjoying the cool air. Kinankop stretched his neck forward, snatching lazily at clumps of grass as he walked, beating out a slow rhythm with his feet. The sky was becoming an intense blue as I looked around us, delighted to be back riding on African soil.

We almost bumped the horse in front of us as the group came to a standstill.

Silence, no one spoke. We waited for Mark's signal to go on.

Something was wrong.

A few more steps forward, another abrupt halt. In a small clearing about thirty feet away stood a family of elephants guarded by an immense female matriarch. Mark had tried to get us past without drawing the big female's attention. But now she was alert to intruders on her turf, head up, ears listening, trunk out to catch our scent. There would be no getting past her unnoticed.



For one brief moment, we were all frozen, horses, riders, and elephants, staring at each other across the grass. There was no fence, no car, nothing but empty space between us. Then the matriarch started trumpeting as if the Day of Judgment had come, her tusks gleaming white in the morning sun, head shaking, ears flapping. She was screaming at us with anger and indignation, "Get the hell out of here or I'll kill you."

Sitting aboard Kinankop, mesmerized by this huge beast, I jerked out of my trance. Mark was shouting, "Go back to camp!" then "Run!" as the elephant thundered towards us. The ground shook under her feet as she went straight at the riders ahead of me, then, turning fast, charged in my direction at the back of the group. Out of the bush behind her came two smaller elephants, both determined not to be left out of the fun.

I felt I was in a slow motion movie watching this massive creature coming closer and closer. Now, horses and riders were everywhere, leaping into flight, knocking into each other, riders desperately clinging to the saddles in a frantic attempt to escape. I spun Kinankop 180 degrees and we exploded forward tearing through the bush. There was no one in front of us.

"How do I find the camp in this labyrinth of bushes and trees? I'll let the horse figure it out. He'll know."

I threw the reins up on his neck, leaned forward and yelled at him, "C'mon, baby, get us back to camp." My African Ferrari shifted into overdrive, dodging round a tree with a swerve that a gazelle would have envied. I barely managed to stay on as we headed towards the next obstacle of a fallen tree. I grabbed on to what little there is to grab on an English saddle. Kinankop flew over the tree in a perfectly timed jump. I could sense the other horses catching up with us as Kinankop careened around some bushes. My fleeting thoughts about the survival of my friends melted away into a surge of relief as camp appeared ahead.

"Oh, shit, the rope!"

It was the rope that the horses were tied to at night, big and thick like a cable. The rope was at neck height, my neck, not the horse's.





The rope is strung across camp covering about 75 feet in length. As close as we were, as fast as we were coming, there was no way to avoid it. And, to complicate matters, the camp crew is standing in front of the rope, shouting and waving arms in the air, their faces turning white with fear, as they try to stop a stampede of frightened horses and riders galloping straight at them.

One might think that a horse, being a sensible animal, will stop when faced with these kinds of obstacles. Nope. The horses know the men will scatter, allowing them to run underneath the rope and keep on going. That's what Kinankop and the other horses fully intended to do. What happened to the riders on their backs was just not their problem.

Somehow this horse has got to stop, but asking a horse to stop a full-blown, panic-stricken gallop when we might yet have an elephant on our tail wasn't going to be easy. The problem was if Kinankop and I didn't stop, the rope would stop me.

I leaned back, pulling hard on Kinankop's reins.

"I am *not* going to hit that rope."

We slid to a halt with a few feet to spare.

Coming up on my left, Bubba on his horse, Mayday, passed me, his powerful horse moving fast towards the horse van. Bubba was steering straight at the side of the van, because there was no way that horse was stopping otherwise. If the horse wants to hit the truck broadside, at least the horse would hit it before Bubba does. Anything is better then a stiff rope hitting your neck and face at 25 miles an hour.

Much to Bubba's relief, Mayday did not live up to his name, stopping just an inch short of the side of the truck.



In the next second, Ellen and her horse zoom past on my right. She is unable to stop her horse before she hits the rope. The impact with the rope catches her right at chest height and slingshots her off the horse backwards.

With a sickening thud, Ellen hits the ground, flat on her back. But her foot is caught in the stirrup! Her panic-driven mount drags her across the ground until it collides with a tree and finally comes to a stop,

The doctors in our group jump off their horses to see if she is still alive.

It is at that moment the rest of us notice that Mark is not with us.

"My God, where is he? Did the elephants get him? Who is going to go back out there to find him?"

We all stare at each other in horror. A moment later, Mark appears from behind some bushes, he and his horse walking calmly as if to say, "Just another day at the office."



When the big female elephant charged, Mark yelled at her to get her attention away from the rest of the group giving us time to get away. It worked. She turned and headed in his direction, away from the madly fleeing riders. He held his horse steady and waited for her to come. She stopped about ten feet from him, probably to think over the best way to trample him, then she came again. At that point, he whirled his horse around and ran to join the rest of us.

Ellen is still on the ground with the doctors gathered round her. She isn't moving much, but no bones are broken and she is O.K. Crying, bruised, battered, scared out of her wits, but O.K. Mark leaps off his horse to check on her, and then insists that she get back on her horse. (After all, this IS a riding vacation.)

When we are all breathing again, we start out once more, this time in a different direction.

I look at my watch. It's only 8:45 a.m. and our second day in Africa is just beginning.

Timothy Allison, reporting on his Antelope hunt experience

Our spirits were high as we rolled into camp at 9:00 a.m. - an hour earlier then we planned, due to the unexpected time change. Mr. Martinez told us that it would be harder this year to kill an antelope due to the deep, fatal snow the previous winter, which had killed off approximately one third of the antelope population. That didn't really faze me, however; because of the great stories I had heard from the previous year's winners. The way Steven Maichak and Randi Woodard talked, you just walked out there, sat down, the guide would whistle, and directly, the antelope would show up for you to shoot it. Unfortunately, that was far from the truth for my hunt.

The first day of the hunt came and went and I began to feel betrayed. No antelope. But that didn't slow us down one bit. As a matter of fact, it just made us walk all the faster in search of goats. Our guide Kenny was the best and didn't complain at all about the long walks. He was right there with my dad and me or the other pair from Oklahoma, Hannah and her dad.

As the sun rose on the morning of the second day, so did our expectations. We started hunting in Aunt Maria's field. She said she had spotted two bucks the day before, but after a thorough inspection, we saw only 2 mule deer and a flock of turkeys. No antelope. As we moved back to "Big Red" (the largest of the pastures), Kenny looked up and saw a buck bed down about 500 yards away! While our dads stayed behind and watched with binoculars, Kenny, Hannah, and I stalked to within 100 yards! Shortly afterward, the buck got up from its evening nap, and Hannah tagged out. That was rejuvenating, but I still needed to kill one for myself.

After taking Hannah's antelope back to camp and one failed attempt (it's hard to hit them on the run), we were back at the hunt. Bi-pod extended, we sneaked down a fence row toward four bucks concealed by a depression where they couldn't see us. As we edged toward them, so did two other hunters at a perpendicular angle to us. The goal was for one or both parties to at least get a shot when the bucks fled the depression. All of a sudden Kenny said, "To your left!"

I immediately went to a sitting position and ranged the bucks - 349 yards. I said, "Which one?" Dad said "the one on the left" and Kenny said "The one on the right!" but they both agreed with their next statement of "SHOOT IT!"

I put the crosshairs on the one on the right and pulled the trigger. Down he went. The whole thing lasted about 7 seconds. But then the animal got back up and started to get away. Kenny said, "Shoot him again!"

So I shot him again and rolled him. We excitedly got our stuff together and walked out to retrieve my trophy. As we got up on him, he jumped to his feet and ran away! This time I didn't even have any bullets in my gun! He ran and ran and ran. It was unbelievable. He literally ran for miles! It was all we could do to keep in sight of him. Finally, with the help of the ranch owner, Mr. Martinez, we were able to get within shooting range again. This time I shot him in the back bone and ended his run. No one could believe that he ran that far after being shot in the head and shoulder. I must admit, for a second I thought we might not get him. I guess that just made the hunt more memorable. We all learned a lesson that day: "If it's still kicking, keep shooting."

There was one thing that Steven and Randi got right - it <u>was</u> the hunt of a lifetime! And I want to thank everyone that helped make it possible for me. This hunt will never be forgotten.



Chapter Member Shoots A Really Nice Whitetail in Pennsylvania!



At our chapter SCI banquet last March, member Wayne Gates won the bid on our auction of a Pennsylvania whitetail hunt with Horseshoe Hill Ranch Outfitters.

Wayne and his wife, Nancy, recently completed the hunt, and they have high praise for every aspect of their stay with Horseshoe Hill owner Bob McConnell!

Coming up again at our March 5th, 2011, banquet and auction, we'll have two hunts with Horseshoe Hill Ranch Outfitters (descriptions are in this issue of *Safari Trails*).

Wayne tells his story...

At a recent Oklahoma SCI banquet, I bid on and won an item during the auction for a 4 day management whitetail deer hunt at Horseshoe Hill Ranch. I called the owner, Bob McConnell, and discussed the possibility of upgrading from a management buck to a trophy buck and he assured me that if I had the opportunity for a larger buck that I could upgrade.

Horseshoe Hill Ranch is located in Western Pennsylvania, about 100 miles northeast of Pittsburgh in Reynoldsville. They have 1,025 acres of rolling hills, tall oaks, and tree-covered ridges surrounded by creek bottom swamps and large strips of food plots. The four-bedroom, four-bathroom, 3,500-square-foot lodge was very comfortable and included all meals prepared and served by the in-house chef.

My wife and I arrived at the ranch and we were immediately greeted by Bob McConnell, who made us feel welcomed. The first evening we were escorted by our guide Nate to an excellent two-story stand. We saw a few deer but none were in the class I was looking for so I held my fire. We went back to the lodge for a fantastic meal and a good night's sleep in anticipation of the next day's hunt.

The next morning it was cold and windy and we went to a different location and saw a 130 class buck at first light. About an hour later we saw a 150+ class buck with 3 beams but still decided to hold off. The rest of the morning was uneventful and about 10:45 we decided to call the truck for a ride back to the ranch. We had been rattling and calling on and off all morning without much success but my guide Nate said let's try it one more time for the heck of it. He rattled and about 2 minutes later we saw horns coming from the hill below us and he said it was a buck they had seen 3 times before and had nicknamed him "Big Tips" and I should shoot him. I took my shot and he buckled but ran back down the hill and out of sight. We decided to wait 30 minutes to be sure not to jump him and give him time to expire. After what seemed an eternity we went to look for sign and found a blood trail that anyone could follow. He had only gone 20 yards and piled up. There was no ground shrinkage and I had just taken my largest buck ever. My wife commented that my guide seemed to be more excited than I was but what she didn't realize was that I was in shock and couldn't believe what I was looking at.







The next morning we packed up for the return to McAlester Oklahoma but first we scored the buck and I was floored when we totaled the numbers and came up with an amazing 195 5/8". I was one happy hunter to say the least.

Horseshoe Hill Ranch is a world-class outfit, and I would highly recommend them for a trophy whitetail hunt.

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MEGANS' STORY

Meagan Hancock

My name is Meagan Hancock. I was born 2 months early. When I was three weeks old the doctors discovered that I had Hydrocephalus. Hydrocephalus is a buildup of spinal fluid in the brain that can be fatal if not treated. My treatment was a surgery where the neurosurgeon placed a ventricle peritoneal shunt in the right side of my head. It is a tube that drains excess spinal fluid from the brain and into my abdomen when pressure builds up in my head. When I was six months old my pediatrician told my mom and dad that I had cerebral palsy. It's not a lot of fun either. It is a physical disability that leaves me with very limited use of my left side. I have had years of physical and occupational therapy and a couple more surgeries and procedures. Sometimes it all gets me down, but my mom and dad are always there to cheer me up.



On the good side, I was born into a family of avid hunters. I probably can't beat you at soccer, basketball or a in a footrace, but when it comes to hunting I think I am on equal ground. I took my first deer when I was six and have taken many animals since. I still haven't been able to get a whitetail buck though. I get buck fever pretty bad.

A couple of months ago my dad got a call from Mike Mistelske about a possible antelope hunt in New Mexico through SafariWish. He didn't tell me about it at the time. Three hunters were trying to turn in their permits so they could hunt a different area. Herb Atkinson from New Mexico went to work trying to help get the permits for SafariWish. Herb had contacted the head of the New Mexico Wildlife Department. Unfortunately the permits could not be turned back in because they were private land. However the director knew of a public draw hunt permit that was being turned in because the hunter would not be able to make it and he secured that permit for me. Dad still didn't tell me. Instead he waited until the permit arrived in the mail. Hunts on!! Time to practice some long range shooting. My hunt would be near Wagon Mound on



the S and S Ranch. I had been antelope hunting with my mom and dad a couple of times so I knew what to expect. I really like antelope hunting because unlike deer hunting we could move around a lot and were constantly seeing animals. Not that I'm going to give up deer hunting, but the antelope are a lot of fun.



We arrived at the ranch late the night before the hunt and got camp set up. The ranch owner, Don Schutz, came out and helped. He was a great help the whole time we were there. The next morning he met us again and showed us all around the ranch and told us where the bucks were hanging out and there were a lot of them. He showed us where some big ones were and we picked one to go after. He looked long and was wide. Very pretty. Don told us that the men who hunted there the previous couple of years had been unsuccessful in taking the one I was after.

We spotted him in a basin about a mile out. We studied the terrain trying to figure out a way to get close enough for a shot. There were two possible paths we could take to sneak up on him. One of them had another buck bedded down about a hundred yards from it though. The other way didn't look as good so dad decided to stalk up and see if he could get me in close enough for a shot. He went out and was able to sneak in really close but didn't think I would be able to crawl up the last hundred yards or so without us being busted since the buck was facing the direction we would be stalking in. He came back and said we would have to risk the second option try to get between the buck we were after and the buck that was bedded where we needed to be stalking. We began our stalk and it was a long one. We had brought my Chihuahua, Hunter, with us to the ranch and he wanted to go on the stalk with us. Mom had to hold him back as we walked away. I'm not the fastest walker so it took a while. After we walked a few hundred yards, the buck that was bedded down stood up. We needed him to go any direction but north. He turned and started walking South, stopped a couple of times to look back at us and then took off running, straight North into the basin where my buck was. After a few minutes neither of them came out so we continued.



After about fifteen more minutes the smaller buck came back out of the basin running full speed south. We dropped to the ground and got set up for a shot in case the bigger buck came following, but he didn't. We got up and continued on. Dad kept looking through his binoculars until he spotted his horn tips. We ducked down and continued on working our way around behind him. We kept his horn tips in sight trying to get into position for my shot. We were almost at the position we had picked when the buck suddenly stood up. Luckily he was facing the other direction. We dropped to the ground and got the gun ready. I couldn't see anything but his head and neck. He was moving around and worried about something on the other side of him. He started taking off and we spotted a coyote harassing him. The buck took off and left the coyote and I was ready to change it from an antelope hunt to a coyote hunt.

The buck ran up and behind a small hill and we decided to go after him again. We made it a couple hundred yards when the buck stepped out on a high spot looking straight at us. Busted! He was still too far for a shot for me but I got a good look at him through the scope. WOW! He turned and took off for the next pasture. We called mom and told her to drive down the road a couple of miles and we would meet her at the road. It's a big ranch. We met mom at the truck and looked over into the next pasture and spotted him on the other side. Luckily that pasture was also part of the ranch. We decided to let him settle down a while and went back to camp to rest and eat. It was a very long stalk and we were both tired.

Two other friends, Bryan and John, had bought permits from the landowner and were hunting in another area of the ranch. They met us back at camp and we discussed all the bucks we had seen. After resting a while we went back out. Bryan and John in their truck, me, dad and mom in ours. We were going to the same gate at a corner of three pastures. Dad got out to open the gate for Bryan and John. He somehow spotted the bucks head sticking up several hundred yards out without even using his binoculars. He was the only one who could see the buck and it took a while for the rest of us to find him even with binoculars. The cerebral palsy affects my left eye too, so everyone got a good look at him through the binoculars except me. Dad asked Bryan and John to drive very slowly down the road on the way to the pasture they were hunting. That would keep the buck's attention while we snuck down the fence line using the cedar posts as cover. Mom drove away a different direction.

We could see the buck watching both trucks as we moved down the fence line closing the distance. Soon however, both trucks were out of sight and we had to slow down and do a lot of crawling. The buck was about 300 yards from the fence, standing on a high spot so he could see all around him for a very long way. The terrain dropped off behind him and he would walk downhill a little and graze. When he did, we would get up and move. He spotted us a couple of times and would stare us down for ten minutes or more but we were low and didn't move so he would lose interest and go back to eating. Dad hit him with the rangefinder. Still way too far. The buck went back downhill a few steps and bedded down facing away from us. Finally. Dad pulled the bottom wire of the barbwire fence up and we rolled under it. I didn't have my eyes shut and got a sharp blade of grass in one eye. No time to worry about that now though, we needed to be moving. The weeds and grass were about a foot tall by the fence, but away from it the grass was just a couple inches tall. We took off running as best I could



across the wide open pasture. We could see his horn tips the whole time. We made it over 200 yards and the buck stood back up facing away from us. We immediately dropped and set up the gun. Dad hit him with the range finder. 325 yards. He turned and saw us. Nothing to hide behind out here. This was it and I was starting to feel the effects of buck fever. Dad was talking to me to get me to relax and settle down. Then the buck did what antelope do and started walking toward us to see what we were. He was walking right at us. Dad told me wait till he turns and I would have a shot. He kept the rangefinder on him and at 300 yards he turned broadside. Dad told me where to hold the crosshairs and I squeezed the trigger. Dad heard the bullet hit but the buck didn't act like he was hurt. I put in another shell and took another shot but missed. Dad was looking through the binoculars and could see blood on his side. He walked in a big half circle and laid down and it was over. I was beyond excited. I picked him up and dad took a picture with his phone and sent it to mom. We took some pictures there and gathered everything up. We didn't have a good phone signal so we couldn't get hold of mom to come to us. There wasn't a road where we were so dad had to carry him to the fence. We finally got hold of mom and she came and got us and we loaded him up. We went and took some more pictures. I couldn't hold him up so I had dad get in and hold him for me. Then we went back to camp where dad caped him out and started processing him. Don came by while dad was doing that and offered to go into town to get more ice. He really went out of his way to help and we can't thank him enough. John came in later with a good buck and Bryan got his the next morning. Sunday we packed up and headed back to Broken Arrow and back to school the next day. I had a great time and can't wait to do it again.



I want to say a big thank you to SafariWish, New Mexico Wildlife Department, Mike Mistelske, Herb Atkinson and Don Shutz for setting this up for me and for all the help.



I shot this 10 x 11 54" wide moose with Shawn Raymond of Coal River Outfitters in NW British Columbia. I used a Kimber "Montana" rifle (5.2 pounds) loaded with a 185 grain Barnes X-bullet in the new 338 Federal round. I used a 2.5 x 8 Leupold scope which made my rifle weigh right at 6 pounds. This is an absolutely perfect big game mountain rifle.

This was an outstanding hunt in some of the most beautiful country I have ever seen. We hunted on foot or by horseback depending on the area hunted. We stayed in a small cabin with a wood burning stove for heat. We ate a large breakfast and dinner every day. The food was excellent considering the remoteness of the camp. I saw black bear, Mountain Goat, Stone Sheep, Wolves, and several other moose. This hunt was truly a once in a lifetime hunt, but I'm planning on going back for a try at one of those Mountain Goats.

Foreword by Mike Mistelske:

In this, a portion of his diary of a trip to British Columbia, my friend and SCI member in Spain, Juan Iglesias, recounts the high price he paid to take a Stone Sheep. Juan's notes are all the more dramatic knowing that he is a trim, tough, mountain hunter—in fact, a guide for mountain hunting. He has recently completed the "Capra World Slam", having taken 12 species of ibex, chamois, and mountain goats—a rare accomplishment. Juan's English is not perfect (although superior to my Spanish), so I've edited just a little bit...but I thought that his original translation, which is a bit "rough", adds an interesting bit of color to Juan's story. I hope you enjoy reading it. Hopefully Juan will eventually share his diary of the other two thirds of his extremely successful British Columbia adventure. Thanks, Juan, for sharing this with us.

In early July, in the Mediterranean summer, I received an email from my friend Bryan Martin, a grand Canadian outfitter who operates in British Columbia, with the news that available to me was a hunting license for Stone Sheep. Considering that these licenses are very few, as the American market accounts for 90% of them, I decided to postpone other hunts in Eastern countries.

I had been several years shuffling this hunt, but high prices and difficulties in my hunting schedule were throwing me behind, and now I had to decide in a few days or this license would be offered to another hunter.

With the decision made and reservations confirmed for flights on July 28, I started preparations: clothes, equipment and others. This time I decided to rent a rifle from the hunting agency. It would be a synthetic Remington 300 Winchester Magnum caliber with Z3 Swarovski scope, 3-10x42 and BRX reticule, ideal for mountain hunting, using the appropriate bullets offers very good results.

Thus I possessed 6 or 7 kilos extra luggage capacity in my suitcase, in addition to the tranquility of not being bothered by scales, strict gun controls, and the customs police.

July 28-29:

The itinerary was Malaga-London-Calgary-Vancouver-Smithers, a total of 26 hours including waiting times at airports. My destiny is Smithers, a small lumber town north of British Columbia, near the border with the Yukon.

The flights pass with normality, in spite of the discomfort of always traveling in the daytime and not to be able to rest in them. We fly over Iceland, the Hudson Bay and come to Vancouver to the dusk, a spectacle of light and color. I stay the night in a hotel near to the airport and at 7 a.m. head to Smithers in a twin-engine plane. After two hours flying over the Rocky Mountains, between photos and videos to this marvel of the nature we come to this beautiful place.

I check in at the Hotel Hudson Bay and lunch while waiting for my outfitter, who arrived about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. After inspection of my equipment, all is approved, and I rest...I am exhausted.

July 30:

The next morning from a nearby lake, we went in a Cessna float plane with seats for four people. I was accompanied by Alan, an American hunter, and his twelveyear old son who also would hunt the Stone Sheep in another area of the same outfitter.



Good weather permits the delights of sight, offering an indescribable landscape of lakes, glaciers, vast pine forests and rivers.

After two and a half hours we splash down in the Stikine River, the headquarters of the company, where we are greeted by Jerry, the holder of the hunting concession, which covers about 35 x 35 miles. This authorization is in an almost unexplored zone of the Mountains Cassiar, leased from the Canadian Government for 50 years at the reasonable price of two million dollars for this period. They have already passed 27 years...and with very good hunting results.

Moose, caribou, Rocky Mountain goats and Stone Sheep are the main species, although there are grizzlies and wolves--these hard to see at this time.

After taking a hot tea and comment on some details, we take our plane to Lake Tucho, our base camp with three log cabins and wood stove; we are welcomed by the team of guides. We see that the firewood supply is unlimited.







The head of the camp, Blair Miller, tells me his game plan while we test his Remington rifle at 100 and 300 yards. The results are very good with Barnes TSX bullets.

Blair, a young Canadian 25 years old and strong as an ox, and his wife Rebecca of 23 years age would be my assistants—she a wonderful cook and assistant with the horses.

July 31:

We get up at dawn, my watch reads 6.5 degrees inside the cabin, after breakfast we employ three hours to rig and load the six horses of the expedition...three riding and three cargo. The plan is to spend ten days in the mountains or until we complete the Stone Sheep hunt. After this task we set off for Spinow, a peak that leads a mountain range very hard to climb, but with good references from other years.



Our caravan is lost in the thickness of the Canadian forest. There are no roads or paths. No one has hunted here for the last four years, and the ancient footpaths of the horses were lost. We start a test of endurance. The pine trees block the way, and their branches trip ones legs. Caution must be extremely high because the higher branches hit you in the face, and the horse occasionally slips when he steps on the rounded stones. Where there are no pine trees, wet tundra covers the valleys, making the horses sink to their bellies. The terrain is exhausting.

After nine hours only with a lunch break we come to Spinow. The legs do not respond and my back is hurting badly. I can only lie on the ground and try to think of a handsome sheep. After taking a hot soup I get in the sack. I feel rain during the night but I don't really awaken.



August 1:

Opening of the season and first day of hunting. Becca, Blair's wife leads our horses a mile downstream and then leaves us afoot to face the rest of the climb. Mount Spinow is overwhelming. The first 500 meters are covered in a thick layer of pine and scrub making for a very difficult climb. It is almost impossible to get through with such branches and carrying our loads. My guide is carrying a huge backpack with forty kilos of weight including his rifle. We are taking all the equipment that we will need for five days. My pack weighs fifteen kilos: sleeping bag, sleeping pad, clothes, and a few other items.

Four hours we attack the mountain slope with innumerable stops. We come to a clearing just at dark, where we surprise a caribou and a young moose. Just in time we organize our camp, and it starts to rain.

August 2:

A new day. After breakfast we lighten our packs and leave the camp. We are on the elevation of 2,100 meters and the wet granite rocks are slippery, making our progress dangerous and slow. We explore the peaks and ravines; no animal is there. We walk back down the mountain, using the rest of the day for photos. We return to camp and sleep.



August 3:

We move the camp eastbound about a kilometer, to the foot of another mountain. About two hours we climb to find a good lookout, and we spot three rams: two young and one old. They are on another summit more than three kilometers away, with a huge vertical ravine between us. It was almost six pm and we no longer have time to approach the rams. We watch them until dark to fix their position for the next day.

August 4:


Planning our correct approach is critical in this open wilderness. We will attack the mountain from east to west to benefit from the light of the strong sun of the first hour. Another consideration is how to increase elevation; the steep slopes are covered with



boulders the size of a table. We decide that only a ravine would allow us to approach unseen. We hope that no wolf has moved the sheep at night. We arrive at an observation post, but there is no sign of the sheep--as if the earth had swallowed them.

We have covered several mountains. Only three sheep are seen...in areas almost impossible with sharp peaks and no options to approach.

Now I understand why only 30 percent of hunters take their Stone Sheep on the first hunt.



Disillusioned by the failure and exhausted by the four days of suffering, I decide to convince my guide to retreat. He accepts and we return to the river where we expect to meet up with the horses. The hand-held radios allow us to maintain constant contact with Becca. She is courageous to be four days alone in the middle of nowhere with six horses and only a small shot gun loaded with pellets against the potential attack by a grizzly or a pack of hungry wolves.

August 5:

I find it very difficult to get up. The accumulated fatigue is taking its toll and we are gradually dismantling the camp and loading the horses. We expect another eight hours back to base camp on Lake Tucho. The road is endless and we see only some caribou running on the trail of the horses. We arrive at dusk and I prepare a hot shower with a rubber bag and a sprinkling can--a bit rustic but very relaxing.

August 6:

Necessary to rest and to prepare to leave the next day...in another totally different direction. It's raining and I am unhappy. The camp guides understand my frustration, but this kind of hunting is very uncertain.



August 7:

It dawns a spectacular day with clear blue sky. The silhouettes are sharp from the high peaks where we are going to try our hunt. They are knife-edged peaks where sheep are supposed to nap in peace. The verticality of the slopes makes it almost impossible for the attack of wolves, their main predator.

We start the march of the horses, slow but steady. We are making progress and enjoying the colors and beauty of valleys and mountains. At 4 p.m., at one of our stops to glass the summits, we found a group of Mountain Goats, the goats of the Rockies. There are several females with their kids from this spring...beautiful!

Three more hours lead us to our next fly camp after crossing a valley of hell. The trail passes through wetlands so uncertain that the horses refuse to cross, and scares are frequent with many risky jumps of the horses.

Upon our arrival while Blair and Becca dismantle the team, I prepare the fire. It is amazing how they are accustomed to making fires only a few meters from the pines. When I explain my concern they reassure me that with all the moisture throughout the forest it is almost impossible to spread fire. Nevertheless I take my precautions around the flames with a stone wall to prevent dispersal.

August 8:

Today our goal is to climb above the thick pine forest to observe the nearby mountains. This is the furthest point of the hunting area. In the past years good trophies were taken here. The climb is very steep and we are more than two hours. As the day progresses the sky is clouded from time to time and a strong north wind makes us concerned. We choose to find a sheltered place to make our camp and to observe the barren ridges. Two Mountain Goats with their babies are resting on a remote sunny perch but no sheep. We end the day with magnificent visibility, but no sheep are seen. Without exchanging words, my guide and I return in the evening. My concern is rising and now I assume defeat as there are only a few days left. Blair, my wonderful guide ends with me on the 15th because he then must go with a new hunter from Oklahoma.





August 9:

The next morning more of the same. Just a magnificent moose grazing on the nearby slopes. It is huge but it's not open season and I do not even joke with Blair. They are very strict with the law. The authorities granted to me the license for moose, but you are forced to carry the meat to camp. Even if it was open season it would not be viable because we are more than four hours from our horses and many trips would be necessary for this task. I'm content to take some pictures. We make our route to a place of singular beauty, but the sheep are not here either. Communication with my guide is deteriorated by bad results. Back to the camp and we must take events as they come.

August 10:

A surprisingly sunny day and we make a march towards another mountain ridge high; from a distance once again we see a moose--this time accompanied by a female, now in the mating season. We decided to return for the horses. The backpack weighs ever more. We arrive at noon and break camp. We ride until we see a hill with a good chance of hunting. We set our tent there for the next day and our last prospects for a Sheep.



August 11:

Becca with us today. After tying up the horses we start examining the slopes on both sides. We see fresh tracks of a large grizzly and we reach an observation point. I see a male goat on top of a distant mountain. The contrast of white on gray is very visible in the distance. We are looking at this when Becca comments "sheep, sheep!" I could not believe: three sheep are crossing along the hillside. One old ram and two young. Quickly we evaluate the situation and decide the best option is to move towards them by the bed of a stream covered with pines. Becca continues to watch the movement of the Sheep. They reach the top and lie down to ruminate. I think, "he is ours!"



We have two hours to advance stealthily and nerves are raw. I do not feel tired and we are going vertical up the hillside to reach a plateau where it is impossible to advance more. We already are in their angle of vision, and we measured the distance to 315 meters. We only see the head of one beautiful ram and his companions are located where they can monitor the side opposite. Our only chance is to wait for them to get up and then try a long shot at that distance. I place the spotting scope, position the rifle and wait. At 45 minutes the ram stands quietly, I place the cross on his chest and gently touch the trigger, at the shot the ram charges but runs only a few yards, rolls another 300. His partners show up to see what happens and then flee a few seconds after seeing their dead companion.



On our arrival a magnificent specimen of twelve years age and 38 inches is lying on the ground. My joy and excitement erases all previous feelings. I have my Stone Sheep! Eleven days of hard work to finally have a beautiful reward.



The Hunting Report

If you have a leopard trophy on its way to the United States, contact your importer immediately to ensure your trophy will not be seized by the US Fish & Wildlife Service. According to John J. Jackson, III, of Conservation Force, a number of leopard trophies have already been seized by USFWS agents for a new reason having to do with the year the leopard was taken versus the year it was exported.

As Jackson reports in this month's issue of Conservation Force, leopard tags and export permits that cite the quota for the year of the export rather than the year of the hunt are now being treated as invalid by USFWS inspectors. Those trophies are subject to forfeiture under the regulations of the Endangered Species Act, by which USFWS enforces CITES

regulations. Already trophies from Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe have been seized at ports from San Francisco to New York. Because the agency treats CITES imports with any paperwork errors as contraband, hunters lose all property rights to their trophies.

To prevent this from happening with your trophies, download the updated Trophy Problem Checklist Jackson has created at www.conservationforce.
org. Send a copy to your operator and expediter in Africa and to your broker in the United States. Make sure each recommended step applying to your trophy has been taken. If your shipment arrives in the US with any errors on the paperwork, return it immediately. If the trophy is seized, you will most likely lose it forever.

Young outdoor writers share hunting heritage, win outdoor getaways

A statewide youth outdoor writing contest is giving Oklahoma youth a chance this year to share their outdoor heritage while competing for the chance to win an all-expense-paid outdoor getaway.

According to Colin Berg, education supervisor for the Wildlife Department, the essay contest is an ideal way for youth to show their love for the outdoors and, in the process, possibly win a vacation in the great outdoors.

To participate, students must be 11-17 years of age and currently enrolled in any Oklahoma school or home school. Students also must use the theme of "Hunting: Sharing the Heritage" or "Archery: What I like about Archery in the Schools and Bowhunting" or the concept of the theme to develop a descriptive essay or short story. Winners of the previous year's contest are not eligible. Applicants must have successfully completed an Oklahoma Hunter Education course by the entry deadline, which is Nov. 19, 2010. There are two age categories — 11-14 and 15-17.

Winners in the 15-17 age category (one boy and one girl) will receive a guided antelope hunt in New Mexico, and winners in the 11-14 age category are competing for a scholarship within the Apprentice Hunter Program at the YO Ranch in Mountain Home, Texas. Safari Club International's Apprentice Hunter Program is a unique, hands-on course designed for girls and boys aged 11-14. The program covers topics such as the history of hunting, the ethical basis of modern sport hunting, wildlife management, field identification, tracking and interpreting sign, game cooking and the SCI Sportsmen Against Hunger Program. There are three sessions — each one week long — during the summer of 2011.

The four statewide winners and their legal guardians will be invited to Oklahoma City to attend an awards ceremony in March. In addition, the top 25 essay entrants will receive a one-year youth membership to Safari Club International. The Oklahoma State Chapter will reimburse trip travel expenses to

New Mexico and Texas up to \$500 per essay contest winner. The winning student essays will be published in the OSCSCI newsletter, "Safari Trails." Publication qualifies the winning entries for the Outdoor Writers Association of America Youth Writing Contest. Several past national winners have come from Oklahoma. Essays may also be printed in Outdoor Oklahoma magazine.


Two educators also will be awarded allexpenses-paid scholarships for an eight-day conservation education school at Safari Club International's American Wilderness Leadership School (AWLS) at Granite Ranch near Jackson, Wyoming.

The AWLS program is conducted during the summer and presents an outdoor program for educators that concentrates on natural resource management. Participants learn about stream ecology, map and compass, language arts and creative writing in an outdoor setting, fly tying, shooting sports, wildlife management, the Yellowstone ecosystem, camping, white-water rafting, educational resources and how to implement outdoor education ideas.
