

See Spot Run: A discussion of cheetahs and cheetah conservation

When I first visited Africa in July of 2009 the cheetah, Acinonyx jubatus, was the first species I saw and photographed. Although it was in a cheetah center rather than in the wild this species will always be special to me as it was like an ambassador, welcoming me to the

continent where I feel most at home. While the lion is still my favorite the cheetah is a close second. It was not until my fourth trip back to Africa that I was able to once again these see magnificent animals and photograph them in the wild.

the vultures themselves. As for stamina they can only maintain their speed for a short distance, prey must be overtaken within 300 yards, before they need to cool down. In fact a cheetah can cause itself to overheat if it tries to run for too long.



Cheetahs are the most specialized of the world's big cats, essentially the feline version of a greyhound. These amazing cats have traded strength for incredible speed, reaching speeds of 90-112 kph (60-70 mph). Though they are incredibly fast they lack both stamina and the strength of their felid relatives. Their jaws are fairly weak and lack the major canine teeth of other cats. Without the strength of other predators they are easily run off of their kills. While in Tanzania's Tarangire National Park I witnessed a pair of cheetahs that had been run off of a warthog kill by vultures. It is very likely that the cheetahs fled the kill out of fear of the vultures attracting larger competition rather than by

While predominantly solitary creatures cheetahs, mainly males, have been known to form coalitions. Males usually disperse and defend their own territories, but some litter mates have been known to stay together. The benefits of forming coalitions seems less obvious than in the case of lions. Females are solitary and wander amongst male territories. Having a coalition would not increase the likelihood of being visited by a receptive female. Single males would have a better chance of mating as they would not have to compete with a companion male for the right to copulate.



The only benefit these males may receive is in hunting as having a companion would allow them to drag down larger prey.

Cheetahs that are actively hunting walk along alertly and will use termite mounds and low hanging tree limbs as vantage points. To get

within range of prey the cheetah may wait at the vantage point if it sees prey grazing towards it or attempt



a stalk. Some stalks are unsuccessful and do not result in a chase, but those that do result in chases are successful roughly 50% of the time. Serengeti cheetahs lose roughly 10% of their successful kills to other predators. However, females with cubs will occasionally try to defend these kills against hyenas and wild dogs, but will quickly yield to larger competitors such as lions.

While cheetahs are fascinating creatures they face serious threats. Once widespread across Africa and into southern India cheetahs have now become severely limited in range. In the 1950s they became extinct in India and are now very rare throughout North Africa. They are still wide spread throughout sub-Saharan Africa but very sparsely distributed. To make

matters worse a series of genetic bottle necks have led modern cheetahs to be over 90% similar in genetic make up. This degree of genetic uniformity means that one disease could possibly devastate cheetah populations and quite possibly push cheetahs into total extinction.

There is a glimmer of hope though as many organizations throughout the world are working tirelessly to save cheetahs. The De Wildt Cheetah Centre in South Africa works to relocate cheetahs captured near ranches to areas where they will not run into conflicts with humans. This centre, where I saw my first cheetah, also has an ambassador

program in which they teach humans that cheetahs are not a major threat to livestock and attempt to foster good relations between ranchers and this species of cat.

Back in the US at Texas A&M is another project which may benefit cheetahs. A professor there has been working mainly with bison, another species that has a severely limited genome, to collect DNA from hides taken prior to the genetic bottleneck the species went through. It is hoped that this genetic information can be spliced into modern bison and add more diversity back to their genetic code. In theory, this professor could do the same thing with cheetahs to hopefully provide them with enough genetic diversity to survive a disease that otherwise might wipe them out.

Cheetahs are an amazing species that have captured my heart. It took me three additional trips to Africa to finally catch glimpses of them in the wild, but the effort was well worth it as my latest trip provided three new cheetah sightings for a total of 6 cheetahs (one pair in Tarangire, a coalition of three in the Serengeti, and a solitary cheetah spotted a few hours after the coalition). It would be a great tragedy if we let this species slip out of existence. Fortunately there are many great people working to make sure this does not happen.

- 1 Cups diced celery


Instructions

BOWERS CORNER



Last December I wrote about all the reasons to bow hunt, how easy it now is and how everyone should do it. Also a little bit about the draw weight requirements and how today's equipment was far superior to equipment of years ago. Well, it looks like the ODWC was listening and thinking too ©

In the upcoming review of regulations, there is a proposal to drop the minimum draw weight from 40lbs to 30lbs. I for one think this is a good move and an ethical one too. You see, the kinetic energy and kill power of today's 30lb bows, coupled with the advances in broad head technology, make them superior to the equipment of yester year. Heck, I would venture to say that a 30lb compound bow has as much kinetic energy as a 45 or 50lb long bow.

Staying out of that argument though, I want to put everyone at ease with the new law proposal. If there was not an ethical amount of kill power in a 30lb compound, I would never be behind this law change, but there is. I see how deep my teens bows go in comparison to my recurve and my 55lb compound and they will surely do the job. I would venture to say that they will be more ethical than shooting with a legal 223 rifle. Add to it that it will include a very high percentage of teens and other men and women that simply can't draw 40lbs and you have a winning combination.

This rule change may impact more folks than any rule change has done in like forever. There seems to be a high percentage of shooters out there that just can't draw 40 plus pounds more than one or two times, and if your straining to draw your bow you will never practice enough to get the accuracy needed. So, if the ethical needs are covered, and practice is increased to up the accuracy, how could this not be a good idea?

This is also the time of year I get to taunt my rifle hunting buddies. You see, all you rifle guys have the special doe season to go and you have to clean up and hang up the rifles for the year. Us bow hunters however are still out chasing big bucks and have about a month to go before we have to go to watching live TV instead of catching the game off our DVR hehe

Late season bow hunting is all about food sources. A little late rut may kick in, but you money is best put on that winter wheat. What I like to do is put a couple stands just off the wheat in cover for north and south winds (if you can only quilt one in for warmth, do it to the one for North wind - wrapping carpet around your ladder stand works GREAT but you need to put it on in the beginning of the season or you will get busted). If you put your stands off the field and not in it, you have a better chance of getting the distance you need for a bow buck. You may see less deer, but the sun won't fade before the shot arrives and in the morning you won't bust em off the wheat on your way to the stand.

Well, off to do some more practice before the weekend arrives so I don't miss my Pope and Young chance with a bad shot © Do yourself a favor and start the new year off right and go watch some archery in the school events and sign up for a league or two. 
A little cooking goes a long way!!

Hope everyone has enjoyed the lovely Oklahoma fall weather! I know this my favorite time of the year; leaves of all different colors are falling and bucks you have been scouting all summer are finally yours to take! So, now that you got that big buck, doe or turkey how are you going to cook it. In this issue of the Safari Trails we are featuring a few of our members favorite wild game recipes, to show case all that your trophy has to offer!

Italian Stuffed Turkey

Ingredients:

1 yellow onion
1 green bell pepper
1-2 jalapeño's (to taste)
1 carrot
3 cups of Mozzarella cheese
(shredded)
1 box Kraft Shake n' baked
Parmesan flavored Bread crumbs
6-turkey breast
1 TBSP Italian seasoning
1TBSP fresh garlic
1 jar marinara sauce (I use garlic flavor)
*Additional seasoning may be used if you want



Instructions:

- 1. Chop all vegetables.
- 2. Sauté in medium skillet with garlic until tender.
- 3. Add cheese and bread crumbs into skillet, until cheese has melted. (Should look like Thanksgiving stuffing)
- 4. Season to taste with dry seasonings listed.
- 5. Prepare turkey breast, slices down the middle to for a pocket for the stuffing.
- 6. Stuff with mixture from skillet.
- 7. Place in deep oven safe pan (big enough to fit all 6 breast)
- 8. Pour marinara over chicken breast
- 9. Bake 45-50 minutes on 400 degrees
- 10. Plate with your favorite Italian side dishes

Theme: Students must use the theme, Hunting: Sharing the Heritage, Archery: What I like about Archery in the Schools and Bowhunting or the concept of the theme to develop an expository essay or short story.

Eligibility: Students ages 11-17 currently enrolled in any Oklahoma School and home school students are eligible for participation. Winners of the 2011 contest are not eligible. Applicants must have successfully completed an Oklahoma Hunter Education course by the entry deadline.

Number of Entries per school: There is no limit to the number of entries per school.

Specifications:

- Students must use the theme, Hunting: Sharing the Heritage, Archery: What I like about Archery in the Schools and Bowhunting or the concept of the theme to develop an expository essay or short story.
- Essay or short story should be double-spaced on white, 8 1/2 x 11 paper, with 1 1/2 inch margins on top, bottom and sides. Typewritten copy is
 preferred. All essays or short stories must be legible.
- Length should not exceed 1,000 words (four typewritten pages) for short stories, or 500 words (two typewritten pages) for essays.
- Students must have successfully completed an Oklahoma Hunter Education course by the entry deadline.
- Papers should be carefully proofed for spelling, punctuation, capitalization and grammar.
- A completed entry blank must be used as a cover sheet and stapled to the essay or short story. Entry must be typed or clearly printed and signed by the teacher or youth group leader.

Judging: All essays or short stories will be judged in one of two categories: 11-14 age group or 15-17 age group. Applicants will be judged on the use of the theme concept, creativity, neatness, proper grammar and punctuation. Winners of the statewide competition will be notified by phone.

Prizes

• In the 11-14 age category: One boy and one girl will receive a scholarship for the Apprentice Hunter Program during the summer of 2013 at the YO Ranch, Mountain Home, TX. The Oklahoma Station of Safari Club International will reimburse the winners travel expenses up to a maximum of \$500 per Essay Contest Winner.

Apprentice Hunter Program Information:

Safari Club International's Apprentice Hunter Program is a unique, hands-on course designed for girls and boys aged 11-14. The program covers such diverse topics as history of hunting, the ethical basis of modern sport hunting, wildlife management, field identification, tracking and interpreting sign, game cooking and the SCI Sportsmen Against Hunger Program. There are three sessions, each one week long, during the summer of 2013.


In the 15-17 age category: One boy and one girl will go on a guided antelope hunt in New Mexico. Winners in this category must comply with all requirements of New Mexico game laws for the 2013 hunting season. The Oklahoma Station of Safari Club International will reimburse travel expenses up to a maximum of \$500 per Essay Contest Winner.

The four statewide winners and their legal guardians will be invited to Oklahoma City to attend an awards ceremony in March. In addition, the top 25 essay entrants will receive a one-year youth membership to Safari Club International. Transportation to New Mexico and Texas: Oklahoma Station Chapter will reimburse trip travel expenses up to a maximum of \$500 per Essay Contest Winner. The four state winners' entries will be printed in the Oklahoma Station Chapter Safari Club International December Newsletter "Safari Trails". Printing makes the essays eligible for consideration in the Outdoor Writers Association of America Youth Writing Contest. Essays may also be printed in Outdoor Oklahoma magazine.

I strive to ensure that it will stay that way and future generations will also have this opportunity. So grab gun or bow and a buddy and get out there in the woods and Hunt!

Hunting: Sharing the Heritage

Five years ago, I couldn't have told you the difference between a shotgun and a rifle. When I met my stepfather Lance, He taught me everything he knew. Now-a-days, we sit around the campfire at deer camp and listen to all the great stories that are told by other hunters. Six sessions will be offered June through August of 2013.

SCI is the only hunting organization that has full-time lobbyists & biologists working to provide sound scientific information to influence legislation and regulations that affect hunting both at the federal and state levels. 70% of funds raised by the Oklahoma Station Chapter are used in Oklahoma for hunting-education, wildlifeconservation and humanitarian-services programs.

Highlights of 2011- 2012

Funded a Operation Game Thief Trailer for the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife - Our chapter committed \$25,000 over 3 years to the ODWC to build a new trailer to be used in the Operation Game Thief program. We received a \$5,000 grant from the SCI foundation to help with this commitment.

We provided the funds to send 4 Oklahoma teachers to the 7 day American Wilderness Leadership School in Jackson Hole Wyoming in 2011. These teachers will now be prepared to take this learning experience and bring it to hundreds of our state youth over the coming years. We will send at least 3 teachers to the 2012 training. The ODWC helps us support this program and contributes the travel cost for 2 teachers each year.

Our chapter agreed to support an additional Shotgun Training Education Program (STEP) replacement trailer. Our commitment is for over \$15,000 to help ODWC purchase a new trailer for this fantastic program.

Our chapter helped fund a youth shooting range at the Oklahoma City Gun Club with a \$1,500 donation.

As a result of our very successful 2011 banquet we were able to provide over \$30,000 to the national SCI organization for conservation and in support of our right to hunt.

ODWC Contributions – Since the foundation of the Oklahoma Station Chapter of SCI, <u>over</u> \$ 280,000 has been funded for various Wildlife Department programs either through direct funding or purchase of equipment for ODWC use.

Education

SIGNIFICANT FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR YOUTH EDUCATION & OUTDOOR PROGRAMS – Archery in the Schools program (\$ 9,500 in 2008), Last Frontier Council - Boy Scouts of America; Eddy Eagle Gun Safety program; Make a Wish Foundation, Youth Hunter Education Challenge, & the 4H Youth Shooting Team.

OKLAHOMA DEPT OF WILDLIFE CONSERVATION COLORING BOOKS - We purchased 65,000 wildlife conservation coloring books for school children.

APPRENTICE HUNTER PROGRAM -An annual youth essay writing contest that focuses on America's hunting heritage; co-sponsored by the Okla. Dept of Wildlife Conservation. Two students in the 11-14 age category win scholarships to attend a weeklong program at the YO Ranch in Mountain Home, Texas. One boy and one girl, 15-17, each win a guided pronghorn antelope hunt in New Mexico and presentation of their mounts at the Annual OSC Awards Banquet & Charity Fundraiser.

THE AMERICAN WILDERNESS LEADERSHIP SCHOOL - Each year, our Chapter and the Okla. Dept. of Wildlife Conservation sponsor two Oklahoma educators for an 8-day experience at SCI's Granite Ranch near Jackson, Wyoming, in fields of wildlife ecology, firearm safety and shooting sports, camping, white-water rafting, stream ecology, natural resource management with a base knowledge from which to evaluate conservation efforts. They bring this training back to their classrooms to educate thousands of Oklahoma youth on the value of hunting as a wildlife management tool.

STEP PROGRAM – Okla. Dept of Wildlife Conservation's **Shotgun Training Education Program ("STEP")** – OSC-SCI supported this program by originally purchasing a custom built 26-foot long gooseneck equipment trailer. OSC purchased two additional trailers in 2008. These trailers carry the program's portable trap machines, firearms, ammunition, safety and gun maintenance equipment. In the past 10 years, 100,000 persons in the state





of Oklahoma (65% are youth under the age of 18) have participated in STEP, leaning the importance of hunting as a conservation and management tool and improving their shooting skills to ensure the humane harvesting of wildlife.

OKLAHOMA WILDLIFE EXPO – Our Chapter supports the ODWC - Wildlife Expo with significant funding and with workers. This is the biggest and the most successful comprehensive hands-on outdoor education experience and recreation event in State history. Approximately 60,000 attend annually. In 2011, OSC featured "Predators of Oklahoma" with a game for thousands of youth to identify the animals and win a prize for successfully doing so (all eventually won). We estimate over 8000 kids participated in our "Predators of Oklahoma" game.

WILDLIFE HERITAGE CENTER MUSEUM, ANTLERS, OK. – Our Chapter contributed to the building of the museum/learning center in SE Oklahoma. The operation is a joint agreement of the Okla. Dept of Commerce, Okla. Tourism and Recreation Dept and the Okla. Dept of Wildlife. The facility will be utilized as a regional tourism attraction while at the same time serving as a wildlife and natural resource conservation public education center.

SAFARI IN A BOX - Safari in a Box is a K-12 education kit designed to provide exciting, hands-on learning. It gives teachers and others who work with young people resources and ideas to introduce youth to important concepts of habitat, wildlife management and impacts resulting from human and wildlife interactions. Initial SIB placement was in memory of OSC member David Rocker.

"SCI SAVES CSI" - 2009 support of OSU's "Insect Adventure", a project which teaches basic conservation principles to over 300,000 individuals in Oklahoma each year (and also contributes to the conservation of the endangered American burying beetle, a species valuable in Crime Scene Analysis).

Humanitarian Services

SAFARI-CARE – On numerous occasions, OSC members have traveled internationally and carried medical, educational and relief supplies to villages in need of support.

SPORTSMEN AGAINST HUNGER – OSC originally funded 100% of operating expenses for the program in excess of \$200,000 annual budget. OSC also managed the program Statewide for over 10 years. OSC continues to financially support this program annually, and in 2011 as we have for the past 10 years we supported this program with a \$ 2,000 contribution to ODWC.

SENSORY SAFARI DAY - A hands-on adventure for sightless and sight-impaired children and adults. Members loan their animal mounts for these people to see for the first time, through their fingertips, animals from around the world. The event is co-sponsored by the Okla. Dept. Wildlife Conservation, Oklahoma Station Chapter - SCI and the H&H Gun Range.

VETERANS' HUNTS – OSC organized Mid-East-Conflict veterans' hunts in conjunction with Jay Barczak of Wild Game Outfitters-Duchess Creek Ranch, Porum, OK, and in conjunction with other supporters. In 2009, three veterans were drawn from public nominations for guided elk and deer hunts complete with all accommodations. In 2010, OSC and Mankazana Safaris presented a Purple-Heart veteran the hunt of a lifetime in Africa. OSC supports our troops who protect our freedoms!

HUNTING AND WILDLIFE CONSERVATION A QUESTION OF ETHICS

Ladies and gentlemen, I am a wildlife conservationist who hunts. I believe that hunting and wildlife conservation are not only compatible but also inseparable. I'm sure you may find irony in that statement. How can I possibly believe in saving wildlife from extinction and then go hunting?



Allow me to share some of my experiences and facts you may not have heard before you decide if what I have said is ethical and responsible. The key to understanding wildlife conservation is recognizing that to live and reproduce, each species has certain needs – FOOD, WATER, SHELTER, and SPACE. Together, the area that provides these needs is a SPECIES HABITAT. Every habitat has limited food, water, shelter, and space available. How large a wildlife population can grow in a given habitat is restricted by these four requirements.

It is imperative that habitat resources and wildlife remain in balance. Professional wildlife managers have shown us repeatedly that total protection of wildlife is not conservation. There are many examples of what happens when species exceed levels that food supplies, water and space can support; and, that wisely managed hunting to remove the excess animals is the best way to accomplish this.

At the turn of the century, America seemed destined to lose much of its wildlife. Destruction of habitat, industrialization, and exploitation of certain animals, caused a significant decline in many species. Hunters, conservationists, and industry leaders responded to this threat by supporting legislation to form the Wildlife Restoration Program in 1937, often

referred to as the Pittman-Robertson Act.

Over the past 70 plus years, the Wildlife Restoration Program has raised more than \$13 billion for a wide variety of conservation activities through a special excise tax on the purchase of hunting and sport fishing equipment. Sportsmen pay 10-11% tax whenever they purchase a sporting firearm, ammunition, handgun, archery and sport fishing equipment......plus sportsmen purchase a State Hunting & Fishing License. Hunting and fishing license fees and excise taxes on firearms generates \$13.45 billion each year.

The money is distributed and matched with funds from State Fish and Wildlife Agencies to pay for up to 75% of the costs for: fish and wildlife management, species and habitat restoration, habitat protection, purchasing habitat (more than 45 million acres maintained for wildlife), essential research by more than 25,000 wildlife biologists, population monitoring, and hunter and aquatic education. Individual state hunting license fees contribute the remaining 25% of the costs.

This means that unless you buy hunting equipment or a hunting license, none of your tax dollars goes to support wildlife conservation – therefore if you are a non-hunter and want to help wildlife conservation, buy a hunting license that will help your State Wildlife Department conservation program....you don't have to go hunting.



Hunters in North America are proud of their efforts in conservation successes. Many wildlife populations are now at historically high levels, thanks to the conservation efforts of hunters in North America.

- Whitetail deer have increased from 500,000 to 30 million and under optimal conditions deer herds will double every two years. (2010)
- Wild Turkeys were nearly extinct and now over 7 million. National Wild Turkey Federation has spent

more than \$412 million conserving habitat and working to conserve 17 million acres.

• Waterfowl increased from a few hundred thousand to 48.6 million.

Ducks Unlimited has conserved 12 million acres of wetlands and raised \$1.7 billion while conserving an additional 2 million acres. (2012)

- Pronghorn antelope increased from 5,000 to between 700,000 1 million.
- Elk population from 40,000 to 1.2 million. Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation has restored over 6.3 million acres of habitat.
- Wild sheep have increased from 30,000 to

200,000. (Foundation of North American Wild Sheep and Safari Club International).

• Black Bear population estimated at 600,000 in North America with 300,000 in United States.

Safari Club International has spent over \$20 million on programs that have

directly benefited wildlife and habitat. Reintroducing moose to Michigan, turkeys and ruffed grouse to the Midwest, funding moose, elk and peregrine falcon studies in Montana and Wyoming, bighorn sheep in Colorado and fighting poaching in Alaska.

Hunters are largely responsible for the creation of the National Wildlife Refuge system and have funded 69% of its 93 million acres. The 86.5 million acres of State Wildlife Management Areas are funded with license fees, Pittman-Robertson Act firearms, and ammunition revenue. Sportsmen also sponsored the Conservation Reserve Program, which added 35 million acres, and the Wetland Reserve Program has enrolled more than 912,000 acres of private lands. These lands are twice the size of the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and National Park Lands combined (215 million acres).

Hunting and fishing license fees and excise taxes on firearms provide approximately \$2 billion/year in funding that is indispensable. The US Government receives another \$1.7 billion in Federal income tax and \$1.4 billion in state income tax. In 1996, the Federal income tax revenue alone was nearly twice the 1996 budgets of the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Biological Service and National Park Service combined. Sport hunting is a \$61 billion/year industry (1998)

There has been a misrepresentation that all wildlife is on the brink of extinction. For 30 years, the public has been bombarded by authorities that wildlife is doomed and hunters are the enemy. The truth is wildlife is a renewable resource if managed properly. The best management practice is to keep populations below capacity in their habitat area, at levels where their reproduction and survival rate is higher. Licensed recreation hunting is the classic form of such sustainable use. In fact, hunters continue to be the force behind the greatest environmental and conservation success story of the 20th century.

Hunting, properly controlled, is without any

doubt the best way of ensuring the survival of all the species of game animals. A total ban on hunting deprives the animals of being an asset within their environment and turns them into a problem and even a danger for those who on a daily basis must share the same available space. In places where a total ban on hunting is applied, the results have been negative. The local people have had to put up with animals that not only cause economic loss but loss of life. Elephants in the Zambezi Valley have

killed more than 100 people since 1980.

In one rural district, elephants devoured more than 200 cornfields. One elephant herd can consume 10 acres of cropland in an evening.....the food supply for an entire African family. One elephant will knock down 1,500 trees per year; destroy fences, buildings, and especially granaries. Heaps of their dung fouls water holes and salt licks and water holes are drained when a single elephant will drink 13 gallons of water each day.



Without hunting, wildlife managers have two alternatives....do nothing and allow elephants to die from starvation as they did in Gonarezhou Nation Park in 1992, or employ park rangers to kill selected

elephants, an expensive task that takes money away from other wildlife measures. The World Wildlife Fund and the African Wildlife Foundation both have agreed a better alternative is for the government to sell hunting licenses to support conservation and development.

The good that hunting can do is evident where villages receive 60% of hunting license fees through the

I, personally, have fed thousands of local villagers who have no way to kill a buffalo, elephant or large antelope.....some people walk for miles to get the meat we provide for their families. Every part of the animal is eaten...nothing wasted. Just imagine how many people are fed by one elephant, buffalo or large antelope.

The National Parks and Wildlife Department receive 20% of hunting fees and uses the funds to pump water for elephants and pay for anti-poaching patrols. The anti-poaching patrols are especially important along the shores of Lake Kariba, a favorite raiding ground for Zambia based poachers. With hunting revenues, it is possible for the government to meet all of these costs for all parks.

Americans spend approximately \$30 million/year to hunt elephant in Africa (1999) perpetuating the long-term survival of elephants outside the parks. Currently the income derived from tourism and photo-safaris benefits only the local hotel and restaurant trade leaving very little to benefit the protection of wildlife.

The Campfire program in Zimbabwe is the model worldwide to foster big game hunting as the principal means of creating incentive for wildlife conservation and operating revenue for wildlife authorities from Pakistan to the Inuits in the Northwest Territories. Over 300 village communities and nearly a million people are prospering due to sport hunting. Yet,
